March focuses on the stories and struggles of women

Hello and happy March from the DV Program!

This month, we are celebrating National Women's History Month, International Women's Day on March 8th, and "No More" Week from March 5th to March 12th. We hope you will join us in sharing or learning about women's history and as usual, ways to support survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, or human trafficking.

National Women's History Month

Much of our human history that has been written, recorded, and even passed down orally from generation to generation has been told by men or from a male perspective.

This month (and whenever possible), practice shifting focus to a "herstory" perspective.

her°story(Noun)- a play on words to indicate any historical writing by or about women; history from a female point of view or as it relates to women. – Oxford Languages and dictionary. com

Herstory in the Making

Have a conversation with at least one woman who makes a difference in your life (your mother, grandmother, sister, auntie, an elder, etc.) and learn a little bit about their own or their maternal herstory.

Some questions to consider asking:

- What was it like growing up with your mother/grandmother/aunties?
- What story is important to you that you hope to share and be remembered?
- What is a tradition that is special to you and who taught that to you?

Remember to give back by sharing with her something you truly appreciate about her or your gratitude for the impact she makes in your life. Finally, don't forget to thank her for sharing her herstory with you.

International Women's Day

International Women's Day is March 8th is year's theme is #EmbraceEquity.

Equity is a combination of recognizing who needs lifting up as well as how they need lifting up.

The basic premise of equity is to provide an individual or a group of

people that face barriers or inequalities with the appropriate resources, tools, and skills to access and receive:

- basic needs and services (safe shelter, healthy food, fresh water, appropriate clothing, physical/mental/emotional/spiritual health services)
- achieve goals for personal and financial success
- enhance self-sufficiency, confidence, resiliency, and collective growth

Communities benefit from an equity approach. As peoples' needs are met and they feel safer, healthier, and more accomplished, they can better provide for themselves and their loved ones. Over time, these individuals will interact with colleagues, peers, and relatives in their community, and as interconnected as communities tend to be... there is a positive ripple effect! Someone that received basic needs and services may then go on to be a teacher or service provider for another generation that may then find purpose helping others through equity.

Indigenous girls and women in particular face insurmountable challenges and inequalities nationally and abroad. Different cultures, communities, and families have wider gaps of power, privilege, and access to resources between men and women, boys and girls. Some of the identifiable roots of these gaps include strict cultural gender roles, skewed power imbalances, and harmful stereotypes. As a result, girls and women are victims of domestic and sexual violence at higher rates than boys and men, and are also more often targeted for sex and labor trafficking. The pressures to perform and dangers of acting "right as a woman" can lead to higher rates of anxiety, depression, self-harm, chronic health conditions, mortality, and suicidality.

For a healthier, happier, and brighter future, let us #EmbraceEquity! As women here at home and around the world are celebrated on March 8th, International Women's Day, reflect and take action how you - a community member, leader, relative, colleague, or friend can - challenge gender stereotypes, call out discrimination, draw attention to bias, and seek out inclusion. In these ways, we can all help lift up our beloved girls and women to help end abuse,

"No More" Week March 5th - March 12th

While the responsibility for domestic violence or sexual assault lies with the perpetrators of these crimes, we all play a role in creating a culture of respect and preventing violence.

The No More Project focuses on awareness and prevention of domestic violence and sexual assault. Some colleges and universities present information from the campaign and you may also see the logo and information on social media posts.

Some Ponca Tribe Services Areas might set up displays with handouts from "No More," but even if your local Ponca Tribe DV Advocates do not post information, you can find out a lot of great information at https://nomore.org/learn/.

On the website, you can learn about consent, recognizing signs of abuse, how to help loved ones that have experienced domestic abuse or sexual assault, and how to respond do not intervene if you

as an engaged bystander.

As caring relatives and friends, we can help those we know find help in an unsafe situations, and we can do the same with others who we have not met. As an engaged bystander, you can recognize when and how to respond to prevent or disrupt a domestic abuse or sexual assault situation taking place. The website gives easy-to-understand instructions and example situations to help you make sense of all their suggestions.

And remember, safety is the first priority! Please

feel yourself or anyone else might be put in danger.



Ponca Tribe Domestic Violence staff attend Justice for Victims Crime Conference

Since 1988, OVC (Office Victims of Crime) has sponsored 16 Indian Nations: Justice for Victims of Crime Conferences (Indian Nations Conferences) that have attracted thousands of tribal, state, local and federal personnel responsible for meeting the needs of American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) victims of crime. The Indian Nations Conference provides participants with a unique forum for victim advocates, prosecutors, law enforcement officials, judicial personnel, social services personnel, health and mental health professionals, survivors, volunteers and others to share their successes, challenges, lessons learned, best



practices, and visions for the future of crime victim services for AI/AN survivors and communities. The purpose of the conference ties in with two of Department of Justice Strategic goals, to include the prevention and intervention of crimes against vulnerable popula-

tions and the upholding of rights of, and improve services to, America's crime victims. It also ties DOJ's goal to provide training, and technical assistance to communities, including Indian Country, across the country to develop programs, policies, and practices aimed at ending domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking. By bringing together Native American victims, victim advocates, tribal leaders, victim service providers, community volunteers, prosecutors, judicial and law enforcement personnel, family violence and sexual assault specialists, medical providers, social services and mental health personnel, probation/corrections, criminal justice and juvenile justice personnel, and federal and state agency representatives to share their knowledge, experiences and ideas for developing programs that serve the unique needs of crime victims in Indian Country.

Red Road Talking Circles offer traditional path to recovery

As Indigenous people, we are fortunate to have our traditions, culture and community to turn to in our times of need. Addiction and mental health are common challenges that we are faced with. There is hope when it comes to these challenges. The answer lies in turning to our traditional ways, our ceremonies. As Peer Support Specialists, we offer our own recovery journeys as well as the opportunity to engage and learn from our culture. We are not experts, we are learning. As we learn and become familiar with our Indigenous traditions, we extend a helping hand to those experiencing challenges in addiction and mental health.

The Peer Support program is brand new, but we are excited to say that we have already been able to use one of our tradi-





tions in an empowering and encouraging way. The Red Road Talking Circle, located at our Omaha clinic, has been up and running for almost 3 months. The results have been successful in bringing a good number of Indigenous people together, seeking answers that only our traditions can answer.

The Red Road Talking Circle is a traditionbased talking circle that includes conversation on the meaningfulness of the circle, and why it is sacred to us. Each circle begins with smudging with our medicine and then prayers to open and close our circle. Often. we are fortunate to have a singer and his hand drum. Refreshments are offered as it is traditional to offer food and drinks at gatherings. Based on clients' responses, the

Red Road Talking Circle is a success.

Peer Support also encourages clients to be involved with culturally based community events. These events promote recovery. Many clients want to learn about our traditions so that their addiction and or mental health recovery journey can flourish.

Norfolk also recently started a Red Road Talking Circle on Wednesday, February 15th from 6:00 pm to 7:00 pm with hopes for just as great as an outcome as the Omaha office has had so far with this offering.

PEDCO program seeking Ponca and Native students for internships with the Tribe

The Ponca Economic Development Corporation, or PEDCO, is a tribal non-profit corporation with a mission to seek long-term sufficiency for Ponca Tribe of Nebraska members and to provide business and employment opportunities to stimulate economic growth and self-sufficiency. PEDCO offers many business and learning opportunities for tribal members, one of which is the internship program.

The PEDCO internship program is offered to current college students that want to complete an internship with a department of the Ponca Tribe of Nebraska. This program is available to all currently enrolled college students, but the goal is to have more native and Ponca students apply for the program.

To become a PEDCO intern, students must send their resume to Larry Loucks, PEDCO Workforce Development Coordinator, apply on a university job board like Handshake, or visit the PEDCO website. Students will then be interviewed, before being placed with a Ponca Tribe of Nebraska department that best fits their interests and major. Interns are typically placed with a de-

partment within 30 days. From there, students can receive college credits that go towards their degree and will be compensated by PEDCO depending on how many hours they work. Internships with PEDCO last 12 weeks long, but can roll over for an additional 12 weeks depending on the needs of the department. PEDCO interns have agency over what they learn and do, and are able to track their progress with the department through a training program they develop. This fiscal year, PEDCO is hoping to place five interns.

Another program PEDCO offers is the Trainee program, which is designed to help new or existing employees of the Ponca Tribe of Nebraska that might not be reaching their full potential in their department. These positions are available for a 12-month period to help employees gain new skills, improve their productivity, and grow their promotability.

PEDCO also offers online education resources that are free to all tribal members and can help with increasing skills in starting your own business, video tutorials on popular office software, general internet skills, and even assistance

to earn a GED.

MEMBERS NEEDED

PONCA TAX COMMISSION:

Under the Authority of the Constitution of the Ponca Tribe of Nebraska a body to be known as the "Ponca Tax Commission" was created. This public agency of the Ponca Tribe of Nebraska is subordinate to the Tribal Council, and will possess all the powers, duties, rights and functions as defined in the Law & Order Code to carry out the administration and enforcement of all Tribal tax laws.

The term of Maci Schott will be expiring on 4/24/23. Therefore, Tribal Council is accepting letters of interest and resume's.

To be qualified to be appointed a Tax Commissioner a person shall: 1) Be an enrolled member of the Tribe; 2) Be at least the age of majority; 3) Have no conflicts of interest, as defined in the Taxation Code; 4) Be willing and able to comply with the ethical duties of Commissioners, as defined in the Taxation Code: 5) Be willing and able to perform the Commission's duties in compliance with the laws of the Tribe; 6) Have or acquire knowledge of the Tax Code, unless the Tribal Council waives such qualifications for the appointee; 7) Have the time available to actively fulfill the duties of a Commissioner; and 8) Be willing to receive orientation and training regarding the duties of the Commission.

Commissioners are paid a \$250.00 stipend per meeting plus mileage reimbursement up to 410 miles roundtrip. The Board members must have the following minimum qualifications: 1) Be at least twenty-five (25) years of age; 2) either (a) possess a Bachelor's Degree in business or a related field, or (b) possess a high school diploma (or GED) and have at least five (5) years of business, financial, legal government contracting, tribal government or industry experience; 3) have no felony convictions; and 4) submit to a background investigation which yields no results showing convictions involving tax evasion, tax fraud, embezzlement or moral turpitude. Applications will be accepted from Tribal and non-tribal members. A \$250 stipend per meeting is paid as well as mileage reimbursement up to 410 miles roundtrip.

MEMBERS NEEDED

ELECTION BOARD MEMBERS NEEDED:

The Tribal Council is accepting applications for District 2, for the Election Board as a term is expiring. Members are paid \$250 per meeting and mileage will be paid for a maximum of 410 miles round trip at the federal government approved rate. Most meetings are held in Niobrara, Nebraska.

To be qualified to be appointed to the Election Board, a person shall:

- 1. Be an enrolled member of the Tribe
- 2. Be a resident of the voting district from which they are appointed.
- 3. Be eligible to vote in the election for which they will serve as an Election Board Member; and
- 4. If convicted of a felony, have completed his sentence requirements, including any parole, at least two (2) years prior to appointment.

No individual shall be permitted to sit as an Election Board member who:

- 1. Has been convicted of a crime involving the theft of funds or property of the Tribe in any court of any jurisdiction regardless of any pardon or restoration of civil rights for said offense.
- 2. Currently holds elective office in the Tribe.
- 3. Is or plans to be a candidate in any election during his or her term.
- 4. Has an immediate family member who is currently a member of the Tribal Council, or who is or plans to be a candidate in any election during his or her term
- 5. No Ponca Tribe of Nebraska employees may serve on the Election Board per the PTN Employee Handbook.

A criminal background check will be conducted.
